“Mobilities”

This year’s conference draws on the insights of the humanities and social sciences on the theme of ‘Mobilities’, exploring how mobilities have shaped, are shaping, and will shape our environments – both social and natural – and our interaction with them, through time. Mobilities will be explored at the individual, community, and societal level, interrogating not only how senses of mobility – and immobility – influence perceptions of self, but also our engagement and interaction with other forces, including through structures of power and the ways in which power and inequalities inform control of mobilities.

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Frontiers of Research Symposia provide impulses in scientifically and societally significant debates. In the spirit of Alexander von Humboldt, they explore disciplinary and transdisciplinary boundaries, identify new fields, seek links to broader society, and meet public debates with curiosity and openness.

Frontiers of Research connect rising researchers who contribute to such debates internationally and subsequently and enable them to deepen this networking in a sustainable way.

Yet scales are not always given – they are constructed to represent hierarchical mental formations of the world, often divided into binaries of significance such as global and local, universal and particular, cosmopolitan and parochial. Studies of mobilities should pay close attention to how scales and spaces are made, imagined, contested and enforced in people’ movement, imagination and their negotiation with the cultural and ideological claims underlying these binaries. <i>The session will begin with short introductions to kick off the discussion for a free-flowing exchange among everyone. It invites participants to explore what role the mundane mobilities of commuting might play in patterning the temporalities of daily life, how experiences of migration might organise biographies, memories and life courses, and what qualities of temporal flow or stasis might be associated with the forms of immobility entailed in waiting, incarceration or quarantine. It also offers opportunities to attend to the contested pasts and futures of mobility through examining what role transformations in the pace, intensity and distribution of movement and migration might have played in historical change and considering what might be at stake in imagined futures of mobility.</i></p> <p><i>The session will begin with short introductions to kick off the discussion for a free-flowing exchange among everyone.
